Customers of the two medieval databases, *Patrologia Latina* and *Acta Sanctorum* are able to search across both databases simultaneously.


The combined resources of these databases offer scholars unprecedented opportunities to further their research in early European social history and the development of Christianity, from the foundation of the Church to the Reformation.

*Patrologia Latina* database is the full-text electronic version of the *Patrologia Latina*.
